The role of the IBD CNS

- The IBD CNS role was first developed to improve the quality of care, education and support for patients with IBD (Philips, 1995, cited in Whayman, Stansfield, Duncan & O'Connor, 2012)
- The IBD specialist nurse improves the **patient experience** and provides **better access to services** as required (Whayman et al., 2012).
- The IBD CNS works autonomously but is an integral part of the wider IBD multidisciplinary team. The role complements and enhances other members of the team (Whayman et al., 2012)



TaskWhat patients need

IBD Standards Section 5: Surgery

- Multiple disciplinary working
- Surgery by an expert
- Laparoscopic surgery
- Minimise risk of complication and aid recovery
- Surgery undertaken at the right time
- Psychological support

- Patients should fully understand their options
- Information, support and holistic care before and after surgery from CNSs
- Speak to other patients who have had similar surgery
- Understanding of potential impact on lifestyle

Action What did we do?

Pre-operative Hospital stay Post-operative

Pre-operatively

- MDT follow-up
- Joint surgical clinic
- Joint adolescent surgical clinic
- Timely referrals to stoma care and specialist dietitian
- Close working with the surgical administrative team
- Pre-operative advice & support





Hospital stay

- Inpatient ward reviews
- Ward team support
- Inform gastro team for ward review
- Discharge advice

Post-operatively

- Post-operative advice & support
- Post-op histology MDT review
- Post-op medical management plan confirmation
- Telephone nurse follow-up
- Surgical nursing input in IBD advice line





Action

What did we do?

Other areas of focus

- Post-operative Metronidazole patient information leaflet in Crohn's resection
- Perianal disease focus
- Ileoanal pouch patients
- Emergency patients
- Further development with our specialist dietitian in pre-operative optimisation

 Room for further audit and development "Wish I had this before"



A snapshot

IBD surgery 2020



- 76 total resections (including defunctioning)
- 10 emergency
- 5 urgent
- Performed at UCLH and private sector





A snapshot

IBD Advice line audit 2021



- 1 month audit
- Just under 20% of contacts were surgical related
